Youngsters are recycling 'kings'

King Edward Primary School has scooped a £300 prize from North Tyneside Council for the children's excellent environmental efforts.

The prize, awarded once a term, is given to schools that keep to their promise of washing squashing and recycling any recyclable materials.

And the North Shields school has done just that, identifying items that could be recycled while also promising to recycle more at home too.

The money will be used by the school's young Eco-team to help fill a special eco 'playpod' in the playground which will be stocked with materials such as boxes, old tyres and rope that all the children can use to at lunchtimes to create new and interesting things.

Congratulating the school on their prize, Elected Mayor Norma Redfearn said: "I'm absolutely delighted that the final set of prize money for this year has been awarded to King Edward Primary School. They thoroughly deserve their win as all the children and staff work extremely hard to do their bit for recycling and green issues.

"Environmental issues are a major priority for the council and I am very pleased that this competition has proved so popular with residents and schools. More than 100 local people have won a share of more than 67,000 in high street vouchers and over 3,000 residents have now pledged to wash, squash and recycle. This is great news not only for the environment but also for the council as it reduces how much we pay for landfill charges, money that could be much better spent elsewhere."

North Tyneside Council has been running the 'Changing Our Thinking' campaign, which provides rewards and incentives to encourage residents to recycle, since early 2014.

Either by entering online or at a community roadshow, residents can make a pledge to wash, squash and recycle at home and be entered into a monthly prize draw for £100 of High Street shopping vouchers.

Let's get Christmas **recycling** right

The average household generates more rubbish at Christmas than at any other time of the year, but there are steps you can take to recycle more and make it a happier Christmas for the environment.

Christmas cards

Re-use Christmas cards as gift tags, or if that's not for you most cards are paperbased and can be recycled in your grey bin, along with their envelopes. Tear off any extras such as ribbons, glitter or bows as these cannot be recycled.

Wrapping paper

Paper can only be recycled if it passes the 'scrunch test' – scrunch it in your hand and see if it stays scrunched when you let go. Foil or glittery paper cannot be recycled so put this in your rubbish bin, along with sticky tape, ribbons and bows.

Cardboard

Flatten and fold cardboard to save space in your recycling bin. Remember to remove any plastic, polystyrene, polythene and excess sticky tape – put these in your rubbish bin.

Batteries

Used batteries should be bagged and placed in your caddy on top of any glass. Free battery recycling bags can be picked up from one of the council's Customer First Centres, or you can simply use a bag of your own.

Cut down on single-use items

This festive season try to limit the use of disposable plates, knives, plastic cups and straws as they cannot be recycled. Opt for reusable tableware instead.

Egg boxes

These are ideal for storing tree baubles safely until they're needed again next year.

Glass

Wash bottles and jars before placing them in your caddy. Caddies must be inside your bin for collection, not left on the kerbside. (Broken glass needs to go in your rubbish bin.)

Plastic bottles

Shower gels and body lotions are perfect Secret Santa gifts. When they're empty, please wash and squash before recycling in your grey bin. Lids go in too.

No bags please!

Please place all recyclable items into your grey bin loose, not in bags. Black bags and carrier bags can't be recycled and slow down the recycling process.
