3. What proposal is this EIA assessing?

Introduction of restrictions for specified vehicles, a permit scheme for residents with specified vehicles, and charges to residents for non-household waste (demolition and construction) at the North Tyneside Household Waste Recycling Centre (HWRC).

4. What is the purpose of your proposal and what is it expected to achieve?

The purpose of the proposal is to address concerns relating to health and safety at the HWRC, and to reduce the amount of trade waste being brought into the site. It is illegal for businesses to dispose of their waste at the site. The proposal will also control of use of the North Tyneside HWRC by business and residents from other local authority areas.

This may unfairly restrict those with this protected characteristic from entering the site due to the specific nature of the vehicle they drive which caters for their specific needs. To address this impact, Blue Badge holders will not require a permit. In addition a mandate has been issued to the Site Manager and a mandate has been given to the Site Manager and the wider team to exercise discretion to help residents that require specific assistance.

7. Have you carried out any engagement in relation to this proposal? If so, what?

There has been engagement with officers from neighbouring authorities who all operate a resident permit scheme for their Household Waste Recycling Centres, and Northumberland County Council with regard to their operation of charges for non-household waste, including reaction and impact on their residents. The Communications and Marketing Team are included in the overall Project Team and have developed a communications plan to engage with residents and HWRC users.

A report was presented to Cabinet on 13 November 2017 to seek approval for the introduction of the proposals which will detail the engagement process taken to date. Cabinet approved the proposals to make the changes. In addition, delegated authority was given to the Head of Environment, Housing and Leisure to finalise and implement to permit scheme and fees and charges for residents depositing non-domestic waste. This work has now been competed and consultation has taken place with the Cabinet Member for Environment.

No, the detail of the types of vehicles and number of permits and rates of charges have been determined and agreed.

10. Are there any potential negative impacts that cannot be removed or reduced? If so, why is this?

11. Based on your conclusions from this assessment, what are your next steps?

Review current best practice to assess if there is an issue with specialist vehicles for those residents with a disability and whether they can/need to be excluded from the permit scheme or special arrangements can be made to ensure they are not disadvantaged.

Ensure the methods for applying for permits by residents and making payments include assessment of needs of residents and that no specified groups are disadvantaged.

The proposed permit scheme will be introduced on 5 February 2018. The system is provided online however provision have been made for residents who do not have web access and/or need help to make an application. Blue badge holders will not require a permit for their vehicle (but the prohibited vehicle restrictions will still universally apply) and a mandate has been given to the Site Manager and the wider team to exercise discretion to help residents that require specific assistance. This will be monitored at pre-arranged monthly contract monitoring meetings and via regular updates from the site during the post-implementation period.

12. How will the impact of this proposal be monitored after it is introduced?

In addition to what has been outlined in section 11 above, the impact will be monitored through regular monthly figures of numbers of permits, tonnages and income from charges, and periodic measures of vehicles using the site. Plus a qualitative assessment of residents' views on congestion at the site, ease of applying for permits, use of the site, and making payments. A review of the effectiveness and impact of the permits and charges is included in the proposed action plan for **April** 2018.

13. When will this EIA be reviewed?

A full review of the restrictions introduced will take place in April 2018 to assess the overall impact of their implementation. This will include a review of this EIA
