PART 1

1.1 Executive Summary:

The purpose of this Government consultation is to seek views on banning the supply of single use plastic plates, cutlery, balloon sticks, and expanded and extruded polystyrene cups, and food and beverage containers in England. Government is particularly seeking views on the potential environmental impacts of substitute items, additional costs or constraints to business resulting from a ban, the impact on the price of non-plastic alternatives as the scale of production of these items increases, and predictions and views on the impact of a ban on consumers.

Government is planning to act against these items as they are either commonly littered, not commonly recycled, or both. For instance, current estimates suggest that only 10% of single-use plastic plates and cutlery are recycled upon disposal. Furthermore, plastic cutlery was in the top 15 most littered items by count in Defra's 2020 Litter Composition Report.

A ban was chosen as the policy measure as it will ensure the desired change and associated environmental benefits are felt quickly and ensure that these are sustained into the future. Also, and importantly, our understanding is that there are viable alternatives available to these items.

This report seeks approval of the Cabinet Member for Environment, on the Authority's response to the Government consultation.

1.2 Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Cabinet Member for Environment:

- a) Note the contents of the report;
- b) Agree that the Authority should respond to the consultation; and
- c) Approve the draft response attached as **Appendix 1** and, in consultation with the Director of Environment, Housing and Leisure, make any final amendments to the draft response before the submission of the final response to the consultation.

1.3 Forward Plan:

Twenty-eight days' notice of this report has been given and it first appeared on the Forward Plan that was published on 3 December 2021.

1.4 Council Plan and Policy Framework

This report relates to the following priorities in the 2021 - 2025 Our North Tyneside Plan:

As Green North Tyneside we will:

- Keep increasing the amount of waste that can be recycled and introduce food waste collections and deposit return schemes
- Crack down on littering
- Publish an action plan of the steps we will take and the national investment we will seek to make North Tyneside carbon net-zero by 2030.

1.5 Information:

1.5.1 Background

The Government's 25-year Environment Plan (A Green Future: Our 25 Year Plan to Improve the Environment) pledges to work towards eliminating all avoidable waste by 2050 and all avoidable plastic waste by 2042, as well as working towards no food waste entering landfill by 2030. The Waste and Resources Strategy recognises the importance of creating a more circular economy, which maximises the value of resource use and minimises waste and its impact on the environment.

As part of Governments wider strategic approach to transitioning to a circular economy and reducing consumption of raw materials and resources, this year, Government has consulted on an extended producer responsibility scheme for packaging, a deposit return scheme for drinks containers, and the introduction of consistent collections of household waste in England. North Tyneside Council has provided feedback via the consultation process on these aspects as the authority recognise that these measures will drive up reuse, refill and recycling rates, reduce plastic waste and enable us to manage waste more effectively.

This consultation will initiate new policy proposals to ban single-use plastic items, which may not be addressed sufficiently by existing policies or other policy proposals.

1.5.2 Specific Consultation Focus:

The consultation outlines the Governments proposals to ban the supply of the following single-use items in England:

- Plastic plates
- Plastic cutlery
- Plastic balloon sticks
- Expanded and extruded polystyrene food containers
- Expanded and extruded polystyrene beverage containers, including cups.

The proposed restrictions on plates, cutlery and balloon sticks will include all plastics, including bio-based, biodegradable and compostable plastics.

It is proposed bowls and trays are included in the definition of 'plates' however Government are considering excluding plates, bowls and trays used as packaging from this ban, except those used in 'eat-in' settings. For example, a single-use plastic plate filled with food at the point of sale would fall under the definition of packaging.

It is proposed that extruded polystyrene food and beverage containers should be within the scope of the ban on expanded polystyrene containers.

It is proposed that the ban will be enforced principally through civil sanctions set out in regulations under Part 3 of the Regulatory Enforcement and Sanctions Act 2008.

It is expected that enforcement authorities would apply civil sanctions in the first instance and a failure to comply may result in authorities prosecuting for a criminal offence subject to a fine only after a failure to comply with a civil sanction.

It is proposed the ban on these items will take effect from April 2023, with the legislation being laid in Parliament prior to this.

1.6 Decision options:

The following decision options are available for consideration by Cabinet Member for Environment:

Option 1

Decide that a response to the consultation be submitted and approve the proposed course of action set out at 1.2 to allow the response to be submitted.

Option 2

Decide not to submit a response to the consultation.

Option 1 is the recommended option.

1.7 Reasons for recommended option:

Option 1 is recommended for the following reasons:

The response to the consultation will enable the Authority to communicate its view to the consultation and support delivery of the objectives of the North Tyneside Waste Management Strategy 2013-2030 and the 10 Year Plan for Waste.
